DO NOT TIP PORTER, since the African-American Foundation will do so.
- 12:00 noon Luncheon at one of the nearby restaurants of your choice: Automat on Broadway between 30th and 31st Street, Bickfords on Broadway between 31st and 32nd Streets, and Chock-Full-O-Nuts on Broadway between 35th and 36th Streets. Other restaurants may be much more expensive.
- 1:00 to 2:30 p.m. Interviews begin in the Josephine Room (first floor) of the Hotel Martinique. Every student must be interviewed either between 1-2:30 or 4 5:30.
- 3:00 to 4:00 p.m. Press conference in the Josephine Room. The several spokesman of the group will be interviewed by the press, but all students are expected to be present for photographs, etc.
- 4:00 to 5:40 p.m. Interviews continue in the Josephine Room.
- 5:30 p.m. Supper at one of the nearby restaurants of your choice. See list above. Please return to hotel lobby promptly.
- 6:30 p.m. Gather in lobby of Hotel Martinique for five-minute walk to lobby of Empire State Building (Fifth Avenue at 34th Street), using Observation Tower entrance on 34th Street. This is the tallest building in the world.
- 6:45 p.m. Elevator trip to observation floor. Please stay in a group so that the Foundation can obtain the group price. Admission to this and all other events during your New York City stay will be paid by the Foundation if was stay together as part of the group. Remain on top of the building as long as Jou like, but try to return for the next scheduled event.
- 8:00 p.m. Party in Ampress Room (first floor) of Hotel Marti ique sponsored by Kenya Student Union in the Americas. There will be dancing and light refreshments until midnight.
